

# Summary of OMB Report as Required by the Sequester Transparency Act

On September 14, 2012, over a week after the statutory deadline, the Office of Management and Budget released a report detailing the impacts of the automatic sequester scheduled to take effect on January 2, 2013. The report provides details for the 897 accounts subject to sequester, a description of accounts that are exempt or partially exempt, and the estimated reduction for each account both in nominal terms and as a percentage of budgetary resources subject to sequester.

Table 1 below provides a summary of the budgetary impact of the sequester sorted by defense, non-defense and discretionary/mandatory. Following Table 1 is a list of some of the programs, by agency, and the reductions that would result from the sequester.

### Reductions for Selected Programs

***Department of Agriculture***

Forest Service – Wildfire Management	-\$172 million

***Department of Defense*** – The President has indicated he will exercise his authority to exempt military personnel accounts, which cover salaries and expenses, from sequestration. This is the only account within the entire federal budget that the President has discretion to exempt from sequester. The following DOD accounts are scheduled to be reduced as follows:
